The Alliance for Affordable Energy List of Issues for Information Gathering Proceeding related to Electric Vehicles

Pursuant to Council Resolution R-18- 537, which set forth a plan for information gathering to inform further policy decisions related to Electric Vehicles ("EV"), the Alliance for Affordable Energy ("Alliance") respectfully files this List of Issues for consideration. Through the instant docket and Resolution R-18-100, this Council has affirmed that policies which encourage electric vehicles are a priority, as they are in the public interest. The Alliance agrees and appreciates the opportunity to take a comprehensive look at the various issues and opportunities EVs present to the city of New Orleans. We are also very encouraged that this docket allows for public input and engagement via comment, technical conferences, and a public meeting.

Electric Vehicles are part of the modernization of the larger energy landscape, and is considered to be an important piece of "beneficial electrification," a strategy that aims to replace fossil fuels with electricity at every point of consumption, providing multiple benefits including cost savings, improved health outcomes, and climate change mitigation. For example, although the consumer expectation may be that electric vehicles are too expensive for the average driver,

studies show that drivers in all 50 states stand to save money by switching to EVs¹, and the emissions reductions resulting from switching transit fleets to run on electricity can help New Orleans meet our climate action goals.²

The Alliance agrees that all items listed in Resolution R-18-537 should be part of the information gathering proceeding. In addition, we provide the following additional areas of interest for discussion and investigation:

- Non-participant rate benefit/costs
- Cost allocation
- Impact of EV adoption in future Integrated Resource Planning.
- Electrification of New Orleans' Regional Transit Authority fleets, School bus fleets, etc.
- Market development beyond the utility to third-party charging providers, and associated consumer protections.
- Emissions impact tracking for climate/health goals
- Address under-served neighborhoods
- Opportunities for private investment, and funds from federal /state programs or grants to reduce up-front costs
- Intersection of Smart City initiatives and EV deployment³
