## To the City Council of New Orleans,

## Proposal for Utility Docket on Rulemaking of a Renewable Portfolio Standard

In response to recent hearings on reliability issues and slow progress on behalf of Entergy New Orleans to provide renewable generation resources, the signatories below urge the council to open a utility docket for adoption of a renewable portfolio standard (RPS) for New Orleans utilities.

The establishment of this standard is meant to set goals for a diversified energy mix that includes renewable energy resources and demand side management measures like energy efficiency, energy storage resources and demand response. Goal setting for these measures will ensure accountability for the utilities of The City of New Orleans to the Utility Committee, as well as ratepayers. This standard should not be viewed as a constraint on utilities; renewable portfolio standards that require utilities to sell a percentage of renewable energy to ratepayers and increase energy efficiency measures are currently in place for 29 states, Washington DC and three territories<sup>1</sup> and have proven to spur economic growth where they have the highest percentage mandate<sup>2</sup>.

A thoughtful standard for the City of New Orleans will pave the way for greater reliability and affordability and will yield sustainable economic and environmental benefits to improve the resilience and quality of life for residents. Such a standard has been proven to advance social justice and equity, reduce energy costs for low income households, and create jobs and small business opportunities<sup>3</sup>.

Furthermore, the rising cost of natural gas<sup>4</sup> and decommissioning of aging sources of generation make a compelling argument for a sizable inclusion of renewable energy resources for The City of New Orleans' energy mix. The void left by decommissioned resources in coming years should be filled by renewable resources, which have consistently seen cost decreases year-over-year even in the presence of tariffs that have been levied on imports. As costs rise for gas, coal, and nuclear generated power, the costs of renewable energy resources are consistently declining. Thoughtfully adding fuel-free resources provides a hedge against these volatile costs, reducing risk to energy burdened households and can improve affordability. The establishment of a rulemaking for a renewables portfolio standard by the New Orleans City Council can address these issues and create an atmosphere of accountability that will ensure renewable energy targets can be met.

Goal setting through renewable portfolio standards implemented for state and municipal governments nationwide have shown that it is an effective and economically beneficial means to achieve clean energy goals as well as increase jobs, reduce energy burdens on low income households, and achieve reliability. According to the Department of Energy, nearly 200,000 jobs were supported by various Renewable Portfolio Standards in 2013. 1,581 jobs were supported by the solar industry in Washington DC in 2017 (RPS of 50% by 2032), which has a similar utility regulatory environment as the City of New Orleans. With a firm renewables goal, the Council Utility Committee has the means to create a path towards affordable energy, economic prosperity and a way to mitigate reliability issues. We, the below signatories, observe that these benefits are evident through recent hearings with our utilities, and urge the council to open a rulemaking regarding a renewable portfolio standard for the City of New Orleans.
